R ecent issues of MN have contained a wide variety of articles about Japanese culture. They include studies on Imai Sōkyū's career, a Dutch New Year in Edo in 1795, the life and poems of Okamoto Kanoko, *kakure kirishitan* ceremonies on Ikitsuki, the beheading of the statues of the Ashikaga shoguns, Abe Kōbō, Zenchiku's *Rokurin Ichiro* treatises, stories of women and enlightenment in medieval times, the shogun's 'painting match', and Onitsura's *Hitorigoto*.

Future issues will feature articles on the life of retainers in Edo, the wall paintings of Nagoya Castle, Ueda Akinari's views on the nature of kami, the latest news about Himiko, Chikamatsu's *Futago Sumidagawa*, the music of Dodoitsubō Senka, artists' attitudes during the Pacific War, the Dōdōji legend, the way of yin and yang, and a medieval tale about an errant monk.
